There were no large subscriptions made to boost the fund, it all being contributed generally and in a spirit of co-operation to put the town over the top, all giving cheerfully for the success of the worthy cause. Over \$500 of the total subscription was subscribed yesterday, the last day of the drive, Mr. Greeley and Mr. Currier personally making the final canvass.
