## Miss Mary F. Hillman, Aged 86, First Woman to Register— Results of Primaries

Pelham, N. H., Sept. 7.

Sixty-two women were registered as legal voters on the official check list used in the primary election today. The total registration of voters numbered 279. Miss Mary F. Hillman, aged 86 was the first woman to register and Miss M. Amanda Cloyd was the first woman to announce her name to the ballot clerks and declared herself affiliated with the Republican party. Mrs. Lena Kezer, however, beat Miss Cloyd to the ballot box and therefore claims the distinction of being the first to cast her ballot at the first primary election taken part in by women voters in Pelham. Twenty-two women voted today out of a total vote cast of 104 ballots. There were 84 Republican ballots cast and 20 Democratic. The contest on the Republican ticket for a party candidate for representative resulted in the selection of Harold S. Frost. James O. Titcomb was chosen by the Democrats. The Republicans nominated Daniel G. Carleton, Frank H. Lewis and Fred A. Greeley, as candidates for supervisors who will be opposed by George P. Wood, Milan C. Stickney and Henry E. Titcomb, Democrats. Forest E. Kelley, Republican, was elected delegate to both the Republican and Democratic state conventions the Democrats failing to unite in writing in the name of one of their own party.

Goodnow, for governor; Spaulding, for U. S. senator; Burroughs, for representative in Congress, and Clyde, for state senator, were strong favorites here as Republican candidates, while Tilton, for governor; Stevens, for U. S. senator; Pillsbury, for representative in Congress, and Adams for state senator, received practically all the Democratic vote cast.

George M. Muldoon was drawn as a petit juror by the town clerk Saturday night, to serve at the September term of the Superior court.
