

## FORMER N. H. SOLON DIES AT PELHAM

George A. Jackman, G. A. R. veteran and old time member of the New Hampshire state legislature, died in his 82th year at his farm at White's pond, Pelham, N. H. Death came to the aged ex-representative Monday morning. His funeral will be held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the undertaking parlors of J. T. Douglas' Sons on Broadway, Methuen.

Deceased is survived by his wife Agnes. Besides his widow, there are scores of associates who watched his political career in the halls of the state legislature in New Hampshire, as well as many relatives, who mourn his loss.

He was an outstanding figure in the legislature between 1896 and 1901, the time when he carried on a fight for the continuation of the street car line operated by the South New Hampshire railway on the Methuen Town Farm route. A quarter of a century ago, the Southern New Hampshire railway formed and wanted a charter. Mr. Jackman's services were solicited and he worked unceasingly until the legislature granted the petition. That was the last year that he served as representative.

In 1901 the same railway company wanted to operate in Lawrence. Again the services of Mr. Jackman were sought and he, with a number of local people, succeeded in obtaining a charter for the trolley lines in this territory.

Deceased first came to Lawrence in 1865, working as a bookkeeper. Later he opened a grocery store at Haverhill street and Broadway. In 1890 he went to Boston, where he was employed as a flour salesman. He had been residing at his White's pond farm since retiring from political life.

Rev. C. Guy Robbins, pastor of the Universalist church, will conduct the funeral services. The body will be removed to the Walnut Grove cemetery tomb where it will remain until spring when burial will take place at Pelham, N. H.
