Town Mourns Passing of Mrs. Luella J. Mansfield—All- Day Session of Farm Bu- reau at Biggar Home. 1939

Pelham, N. H., Oct. 31.

The death of Mrs. Luella J. Mansfield, wife of Carl M. Mansfield, who died yesterday at her home in Jeremy Hill is deeply mourned by her townspeople and her many friends in adjoining localities.

After an illness of two years she passed away at the age of 56 years, 5 months, 10 days. Mrs. Mansfield was treated at the Lowell General hospital about two years ago for an ailment of a serious nature, but showed marked improvement later, becoming able to resume the household duties at her home also resuming active interest in local affairs.

Recently she again became seriously ill of the old disorder which resulted in her death. For years Mrs. Mansfield applied herself personally to problems of public interest affecting the town's welfare and devoted herself especially to the interests of Pelham Congregational church of which she was an active member. She was treasurer of Pelham Grange and a member of the Ladies Aid Society.

Besides her husband, Carl M. Mansfield, she leaves one son, Richard C. Mansfield. Her father, Clarence M. Wyman lives with her sister, Mrs. Estelle Carleton, in Pelham and there are four other sisters also, Mrs. Florence Piper of New York city, Mrs. Ida Spaulding of Derry, N. H., Mrs. Eliza Peters of Windham, N. H., and Mrs. Lillian Grocut of Shrewsbury, Mass.
