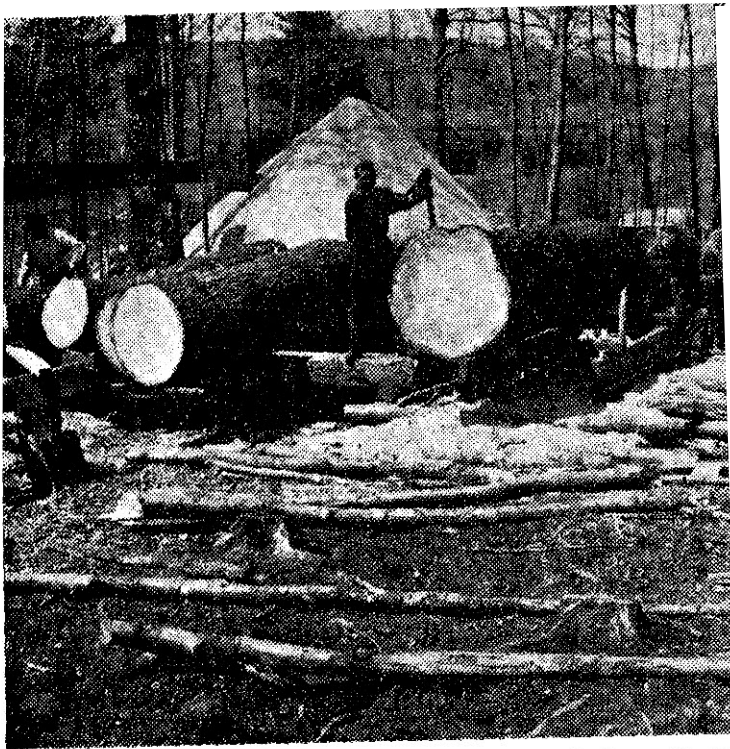


# Largest Single Stick of Timber Logged in Pelham

Century-Old, White Pine, 36 Inches in  
Diameter, Yields 2500 Feet of Timber  
--Legislature Honors Carriers



One of the largest trees yet to be logged in Pelham, N. H., was that on the Cutter lot in the Long pond section of Pelham. The huge logs cut from the century-old white pine were cut by Muldoon brothers. The tree was felled during the hurricane last September.

Muldoon Brothers have just milled the largest single stick of timber known to have been cut in this vicinity. This mammoth white pine was a victim of the September hurricane and stood among others of exceptional dimension for these parts, on what is known as the Susan M. Cutter lot at Long Pond, Pelham.

The tree showed rings marking yearly growths that counted 105, establishing the fact that it was without doubt over a century old.

It measured 36 inches in diameter at the stump end and the first log cut, 14 feet in length, contained over 1000 feet board measure. The tree was logged in lengths that totalled 74 feet and by board measure rule contained 2500 feet of lumber.

The tree was 100 feet in length, stump to tip—the top being broken by the fall. There are still eight or nine trees almost as large in dimension standing on this lot, a few even taller than this victim of the hurricane.
