

PELHAM.**Funeral of Mrs. Simpson Largely Attended.**

Pelham, March 31.—The funeral of Mrs. Dwelley Simpson took place yesterday afternoon, the services being conducted by Rev. J. L. Hoyle. Prayers were offered at the residence at 1 o'clock and the public services were held at the church and the cemetery.

A quartet consisting of Mrs. Chas. Colman, Mrs. E. Hyde, George Wood, and Rev. J. L. Hoyle sang, "Jesus Savior Pilot Me," "Some Sweet Day," and "Rock of Ages," Mrs. F. H. Hillman presided at the organ. There were many beautiful floral tributes. Undertaker W. E. Woodbury of Londonderry had charge.

Besides a husband, Mrs. Simpson leaves a daughter, Grace, three grandchildren, Edith Simpson, Florence Ellsworth, and Inez Smith. She leaves also a mother, who makes her home in Haverhill.

The bearers were three brothers and a brother-in-law, Henry Tabor and Amos Fitts of Hampstead, N. H., and John and Ellery Tabor of Haverhill. Mrs. Simpson was 50 years and five months old. The burial was in the family lot in the cemetery at the Centre.

The auction of the property belonging to the "Whitehouse" estate was sold at public auction last Tuesday afternoon. The home farm was purchased by Mrs. Philena Scruton for \$4200.

The Hill pasture lot was bought by Miss Gage of Lowell for \$3600, and the Hudson lot for \$150.
