

# Train Knocks One-Man Car Off Rails; Six Persons Hurt

Proceeding Slowly at Time of Crash on Nashua  
Crossing—Motorman Hurled Through  
Glass of Trolley

NASHUA, N. H., Nov. 19—Six persons were injured and were taken to Memorial Hospital after a south-bound through freight struck a one-man electric car from Pelham at the Hollis street crossing, at the Union Station railroad at 5:27 o'clock this evening.

Passengers on the car state that when it arrived at the railroad crossing the gates were down and a north-bound freight was passing. As its aboose cleared the crossing, the gates were raised, passengers said, and the operator of the electric car started across the tracks. The receding north-bound train hid from his view the approaching southbound freight until too late to stop or clear the track, but Engineer Southard saw the electric car while about 200 feet distant and applied his emergency brakes, so that when he struck the car, the impact was not sufficient to overturn it, or crash through, but simply pushed the car off

the iron and around parallel to the railroad track.

The engine came to a standstill only a few feet farther on. Operator Daniel Carlton of Pelham was thrown headlong through the front of his car and sustained the most serious injuries. One eyelid was lacerated, requiring several stitches, his face and head were badly cut and a number of bits of glass were removed from the eye. He was, however, able to return to his home after treatment at the hospital.

The five passengers on the car all received cuts and bruises, but only two were unable to leave the hospital tonight. They are Mrs. Christiana Boyd, 66, of the Intervale Fruit farm, Hudson Centre, who sustained a severe blow on the back of the head, and Eugene Kimball, a farmer, also of Hudson, whose back was injured.

The other passengers treated for minor injuries were Steve Bougas, mill operative, Hudson; Paul Lefevre, wood-chopper, 74 Walnut street, Nashua, and Miss Bessie Bradley, Hudson, telephone operator.
