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Massachusetts Service.

MARSHALL, ISAAC

(New Hampshire residence from 1790.)

August 27, 1832 Isaac Marshall of Pelham, Hillsborough County, New Hampshire, seventy-three years of age, deposed:

that he enlisted for two months in 1776, at Chelmsford, Mass., where he then resided; served in New York state under Capt. Zacheus Wright, Col. Brooks, Massachusetts troops;

was in the battle of White Plains; and after his term expired, was discharged;

that he enlisted to go to Rhode Island in 1778 for three months, under Capt. John Minot, but before serving was transferred to Capt. Boynton's company, Col. Josiah Whitney, Massachusetts troops; served out his time and was discharged;

that before the capture of Burgoyne in 1777 he enlisted under Capt. Stephen Russell of Dracut, and served out his term at Bennington and many other places which he does not remember; then returned to Chelmsford;

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that he was born at Chelmsford, Mass., December 23, 1759; lived there until 1790 when he moved to Pelham, where he has lived ever since;

and that he never received a written discharge.

Rev. John H. Church, D.D., and Samuel M. Richardson, both of Pelham, certified that it is the general belief in the neighborhood in which Isaac Marshall lives, that he has been a soldier in the Revolution, in which opinion we concur.

December 12, 1832 ASA HODGMAN of Chelmsford, Mass., seventy-five years of age, testified to service with Marshall under Capt. Zacheus Wright and that they were in the battle of White Plains together.

Claim allowed and Certificate 6837, New Hampshire Agency, was issued March 8, 1833, Act of June 7, 1832.

(There was an ISAAC MARSHALL of Waterbury, Vt., in 1826 who testified that he enlisted in 1775 from South Hadley, Mass., served under Capt. Reuben Dickinson near

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Boston several months; that part of the time PETER MARSHALL, served as his substitute; that in 1818 he applied but his application was rejected;

that at that time he had a wife, who has since died. Claim rejected as service did not come within the kind, prescribed in 1818. See MARSHALL, ISAAC Mass. R6923. These are the only two Revolutionary Pensioners of the name from a New England State. BMD.)

From memorandum on file it appears that Isaac Marshall was still living in Pelham in 1840, aged eighty-two years.
