To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges and make appropriations of the same.
4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, and set apart for town maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department for the ensuing year.
6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department for the ensuing year.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$240 for street lighting for the ensuing year.
8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the aid of the town poor for the ensuing year.
9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for old age assistance for the ensuing year.

and appropriate for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law.

11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemeteries for the ensuing year.

12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on the town debt.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to defray interest charges on town notes for the ensuing year.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100.00 for the repair of railings on the North Bridge on the Windham road.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise \$1,200.00 for W. P. A. projects for the ensuing year, or take any other action relative thereto.

17. To see if the town will accept state aid, and raise and appropriate sufficient money to carry the same into effect.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$485.27 as the town's share of T. R. A. for construction of class V roads, or take any other action relative thereto.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to purchase snow fence, or take any other action relative thereto.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for snow removal, or take any other action relative thereto.

21. To see if the town will vote to ratify the decision of the Selectmen accepting a highway 25 feet wide from the end of the highway near the house of Thomas Griffin to Island Pond, as presented by a petition of J. Arnold Archambault and others.

22. To see if the town will vote to construct a traffic circle at Pelham Center as suggested by the State Highway

Department, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for a W. P. A. project to construct the same, or take any action relative thereto.

23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of or administer on property acquired by tax deeds.

25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for redecoration of interior of the Town Hall.

26. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3 per cent on the 1937 tax list, paid on or before June 1, 1937; 2 per cent if paid on or before August 1, 1937; 1 per cent if paid on or before October 1, 1937.

27. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their annual appraisal in April.

28. To take the sense of the qualified voters on the following question: to wit: Is it expedient to revise the Constitution?

29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

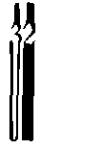
