10. To see if the town will continue to reserve the 30 acre lot of the Gage property (D. Atwood lot) as a town wood-lot. The wood to be used for town and school district purposes.

11. To see if the town will vote to have a map or plan of the town made, showing location of all properties in town.

12. To see if the town will vote to grant a discount on all property taxes paid in full, 2% on or before July 15, 1938; and 1% on or before the first day of September, 1938.

13. To see if the town will vote to levy a 20 cent fine on all poll taxes not paid before December 1, 1938.

14. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their annual appraisal in April.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Deeds were obtained from the administrators of Miss Gage's estate. In 1935 this property was assessed for about 1029 acres.

Your committee in accordance with vote of 1936 Annual Town Meeting after conferring and investigating with leaders and representatives of Scouts and both 4-H Clubs reserved the 100 acre tract located in North Pelham known as the George Webster lot for the use of these organizations.

Selectmen were requested to insure buildings on the tract known as "Frye Gage Farm".

The thirty (30) acre "D. Atwood lot adj. Hobbs" was voted to be held for Town wood lot until definite action had been taken by Town at next Annual Meeting.

An attempt was made to obtain a Federal project for drawing plans and locating Gage property. No funds available for Committee's use.

Part of Moody Hobbs Place sold to Frank L. Dwyer, of Lawrence, for \$250.00. Expense of sale covered by Town Charges.

In accordance with action taken at last Annual meeting the swamp-hole on Hobbs Road located on Frye Gage Property was chosen by Committee for a Town dump.

The following recommendations are made by your committee :

1. That the Town take action to provide funds for expense of locating and selling tracts.

2. That the Town establish a Planning Board, to serve without salary, to approve all buildings plans in Town, authorizing a fee of \$1.00 for a permit to build.

3. That the Town continue to reserve the lot previously described as a Town wood lot. Wood to be used for the Town or School District purposes, labor of cutting to be supervised welfare work.

4. That the Town take definite action to have map or plan of entire Town made showing location of all properties in Town.

## REPORT OF HEADMASTER

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*To the Superintendent of Schools, the School Board, and  
Citizens of Pelham:*

Herewith is submitted the annual report of Pelham High School for the current school year.

High School enrollment at the beginning of the year was sixteen pupils, four pupils in grade ten, and twelve pupils in grade nine.

The curriculum for 1937-38 is as follows:

Pupils are required to carry four units of work each year, with an option of taking five units in any year with the permission of the headmaster.

Through co-operation of the State Department of Education and the State Department of Motor Vehicles, we are offering again a non-unit course in safety and motor vehicle operation, designed to reduce loss of life from motor vehicle accidents and to help those pupils who are anticipating taking the examination for driver's license in the near future.

The Social Society is in operation again this year, and a Christmas party was given by the members. Other social events are planned for later in the year, and beginning the last of January informal dancing instruction will be given as a club activity once each week at school.

A Public speaking contest will be held during the school year, and a school paper, the "Lowdown" will appear bi-monthly. The paper will contain school news and notes, and material connected with English courses offered in the school. A play is planned for presentation in the spring.

A new type of club activity has been inaugurated this year, and will combine school club work, scouting and 4-H activities. This group will meet twice each month at the school, with the school clubs under the direction of the

headmaster and the Scout and 4-H work under the leadership of some citizen volunteer who will have charge of the various projects.

This club activity is designed to provide opportunity for club work for all those pupils who otherwise might be unable to participate in work of this nature outside of school hours.

Soup is being served during the colder months with the generous help of the local Parent-Teacher Association.

We wish to thank all those who have aided us and who have manifested an interest in our work during the past year.

As usual during the past few years, the townspeople have been generous in providing for the needs of the children, particularly the Parent Teachers Association, who have furnished soup and sponsored the dental clinic and the Red Cross who gave shoes and rubbers to those who were staying from school because of need. At Christmas time several ladies gave clothing, food, fruit and presents to a number of children.

Dr. Robert B. Kerr of the New Hampshire Anti Tuberculosis Association again gave a chest examination to all who wished to be examined and found an improvement in the general condition and posture of the children.

Dr. Thomas Welch of Nashua spent a day in town treating teeth.

We appreciate having the use of the Library for the chest clinic and found the basement room in the Junior

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High School a very satisfactory place for the dental clinic.  
Dr. Ralph W. Parker vaccinated the pre-school children.
