## SELECTMEN'S REPORT

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At this time we would like to call your attention to the financial condition of the town in a clearer manner than just numbers and figures.

We acknowledge that we went over on Town Hall Appropriation, but look at the things of improvement we bought (100) one hundred new chairs badly needed, 12 dozen knives, 12 dozen forks, 15 dozen teaspoons and 4 dozen table spoons. Built a new stage which was needed for our young people to put on entertainments, and give them a chance to show the people of the town, that we have talent in our own town.

Put in electric lights in the down stairs which were needed to take care of lighting up for suppers and lunches, also to be used to a great advantage for election and counting ballots at night, also put on exit lights where the law required them.

The Chief of The Fire Department told us we would have to swing the two front doors on the Town Hall out, so after careful study of the plan we found it necessary to put on a piazza for the people to step out on, also the Town Hall was beginning to show wear and needed a coat of paint we put it up for bids and got a good job done for less than one hundred and fifty dollars. So that is why the Town Hall appropriation went over.

We would recommend that new toilets be put in the Town Hall.

Less than ten years ago the Town debt was over ten thousand dollars; today we owe approximately four thousand dollars and at the rate of taxation we have been receiving in five or six years, without any disaster we should be out of debt.

We recommend that one thousand dollars on the Trust Fund, that was borrowed be paid back this year, leaving about nine hundred to be paid back next year.

We would like to thank all our department heads for their cooperation in keeping their appropriations within the amount given to them.

We have a cash balance in the hands of the treasurer, February 1, 1940 of \$6,601.58 against \$4,268.85, February 1, 1939, and we owe less on outstanding bills.

Again thanking you all for your cooperation in all Town work and business, we are your servants the Board of Selectmen of Pelham.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham, on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects: *Sw. in West Street - Kelly, Gaudin, & Holts*

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To see if the town will vote to adopt the town budget as prepared by the budget committee, or make any alterations or additions thereto.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,480.50 as the town's share of State Aid Construction of highways, or take any other action relative thereto.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$488.11 as the town's share of Town Road Aid for the constuction of Class V roads, as recommended by the (three-ton trucks to be used for snow plowing and hauling) budget committee.
5. To see how much money the town will vote to pay the Town Debt. (The recommendation of the budget committee is the note due December 1, 1940, and refund \$1,000, of the Trust Funds now used by the town.)
6. To see if the town will vote to require a permit to be issued before construction or alteration of any building used or to be used to shelter human beings, horses or cattle, said permits to be issued by the selectmen, and the selectmen may require plans and specifications and withhold any permit that does not properly safeguard the health of the occupants or of the commuinity. *pass over*
7. To see if the town will vote to purchase one or more of gravel, and to raise not exceeding \$3,000 as an appropriation to pay for the same. If passed in the affirmative to see if the town will elect reliable men responsible for this equipment. *pass over*

8. To see if the town will vote to prohibit Road Agents or Selectmen from using their own trucks on highway work.

The only contagious disease during the year was measles, with most of the cases being around Pelham Center and several cases in North Pelham. In the other districts the general health of the pupils has been very good. After opening school in September there was a question of a case of Infantile Paralysis but it was found to be negative.

A dental clinic sponsored by the P. T. A. was held in the Junior High School in March. Dr. T. B. Welch, Nashua, N. H. was officiating dentist. There was a small charge to each child for each treatment.

The P. T. A. also sponsored the soup project again this year, and the Red Cross furnished shoes and rubbers to those in real need.

Some of the charitably minded people of the community brought Christmas cheer to a number of needy children at Christmas time.

## REPORT OF HEADMASTER

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Pelham, N. H.

To the Superintendent of Schools, the  
School Board, and Citizens of Pelham:

Herewith is submitted the annual report of Pelham High Schools

The current school year opened with an enrollment of twenty-seven, a relatively heavy registration for our high school. Grade X had fifteen members, and Grade IX had twelve members. All members of the Junior High School graduating class returned to High School.

On the recommendation of Mr. Russell Leavitt, the state secondary school agent, the 40 minute periods (full unit courses) have been increased to 50 minutes, but all unit classes meet for four classes weekly rather than five periods as formerly. This is a great administrative advantage, as well as meaning a more even distribution of preparation-time on the part of the pupils. The total instruction, 200 minutes per week per unit, remains the same.

The curriculum for 1939-40 is as follows, the courses alternating with those of last year:

- English I 50 min. period, 4 days per week
- \*French I-II 50 min. period, 4 days per week
- \*Jr. Business Tr. 50 min. period, 4 days per week
- World Culture 50 min. period, 4 days per week
- General Science 50 min. period, 4 days per week
- Fundamentals 30 min. period, 2 days per week
- (\*Elective)

The following club activities or extra-curricula projects will have been included in the year's work: Safety and Automobile; Bird; Social Society; Play; public musical presentation; school paper, "Tattler." Under their respective leaders, the girls are continuing their 4-H projects, and the boys are taking shop work and manual arts.

We wish to thank parents for helping us keep our good record of attendance and tardiness.
