of Hillsborough, qualified to vote in Town affairs:*

Polls open 10 A. M. to 7 P. M.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and as provided by law.

2. To see if the town will accept the town budget as prepared by the Budget Committee.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges and make appropriations of the same.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise \$1,584.00 as the town's share on construction of the State Aid Secondary System for 1946.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise \$500.00 as a highway Post War Fund, to be used on the highways as recommended by the State Highway Commissioner.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the purchase of a V-shaped snow plow.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one per cent (1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1945 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Merrimack Valley Region Association, the sum of \$105.64.

8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to complete the installation of the toilets in the Town Hall.

9. And if the article regarding the Town Hall toilets is passed in the affirmative, to see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to finance the completion of the toilets in the Town Hall.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to acquire a piece of land on Old Lawrence Road, formerly the Gage property, to be used as a town dump.

11. And if the article regarding the location of the town dump on Old Lawrence Road is passed in the affirmative, to see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to finance the upkeep of this dump.

12. If the articles on the town dump on Old Lawrence Road and the appropriation of money to maintain this dump are passed in the affirmative, that the Selectmen be authorized to close the dump now situated on Hobbs Road.

13. To see if the Town will vote to elect one Highway Agent next year, March 1947, instead of two, as at present.

14. To see in what manner the town will finance the Emergency loan of \$2,000.00 borrowed from the Second National Bank of Nashua.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the observance of its 200th Anniversary and Welcome Home for the Veterans of World War II.

16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their annual appraisal in April.

17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

18. To see if the town will vote to grant a discount on all property taxes of the 1946 list, paid in full, 2% on or before August 1, 1946; 1% on or before October 1, 1946, or take any other action relative thereto.

19. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to make regulations as to construction of new buildings, issue permits, and submit zoning by laws.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Pelham, New Hampshire.

February 18, 1946.

To the School Board and Citizens of the Town of Pelham:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

We were able during the present school year to further reorganize the Pelham schools. The ninth grade was discontinued by consent of the Superior Court. This gave us room in the Junior High School building for the four upper grades.

A little study of the enrollment table connected with this report shows that we have three four grade schools, Gumpus with an enrollment of twenty-three, Gage Hill with twenty-eight, and Center School with thirty-three. Three teachers take care of these schools very well indeed. We were able to close North Pelham and transport the fifth grade to the Junior High building, where three teachers take care of the seventy-eight pupils. This makes a very efficient organization. The Junior High building cannot, under its present organization, accommodate any more grades. Conditions in Pelham are now such that we can easily transport all of the pupils to the Center and with seven or eight teachers have an excellent organization, with one grade to a teacher. This will add very much to the efficiency of the Pelham system.

It has been suggested that we build a new building to accommodate all the grades and in addition a High School. The answer to this suggestion is, the number of pupils in Pelham attending high school, about fifty, is too small for a well appointed high school. Therefore, either additions to the present building or a new building to accommodate the eight grades is a far better solution to the problem. The three lower grade centers add very much to our schools. These schools do much better work than we could do if we were under the old eight grade system or even a six grade system.

The problem of transportation to high school is a very great one, which can only be solved by good will and co-operation of all the parents concerned. We may have some recommendations to make concerning this problem at the district meeting. I recommend that a committee be appointed at our March meeting to study the whole situation and make report at the 1947 district meeting.

The total number of pupils, including the ninth grade, a year ago was one hundred seventy-one. The total number of pupils at present, minus the ninth grade, is one hundred sixty-two. The Pelham School Board is to be congratulated on having so well met the problems of organization in these changing times. With the buildings used and number of teachers employed our system right now is, without a doubt, one of the best in the state of New Hampshire. The future outlook is bright. A real centralized school seems to be not only possible but very practical in the next two or three years.

There have been no new teachers this year in our schools. Miss O'Meara of the North Pelham school secured a position in Derry. We are fortunate in being able to keep all of our teachers. We expect the teacher shortage to continue for the next four or five years.

In closing, I would like to thank the School Board, teachers and many interested citizens, who have contributed to the work of our schools.

In December the State Board of Health and the Department of Education combined their efforts to run toxoid clinics all over the state of New Hampshire, because of the outbreaks of diphtheria in different parts of the state. On the whole, our pupils seem to be in good physical condition, and the attendance has been much better as far as sickness is concerned.

I would like to thank Mr. Barrett, the School Board, the teachers, and all the parents who have cooperated with me to the fullest.

ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
